WHERE IS THE MONEY SPENT?

Below are examples from 2020/21 of how the Shire funds are spent to provide services to the community.



COMMUNITY AMENITIES \$6,156,500

30ha of lawns and ovals have been maintained this financial year.

1.4 million containers deposited at the Containers for Change refund point from October.



RECREATION AND CULTURE \$459.100

21,741 entries into the Newman gym using a member's access card.

249 artists engaged across seven remote Communities at Martumili.

31,548 entries into the Newman Aquatic Centre in the 2020/21 pool season.



LAW, ORDER AND PUBLIC SAFETY **\$1,244,400**

15,000km travelled by rangers for animal control emergency management.

Rangers have responded to more than **975** call outs this financial year for snake handling and assistance.



HEALTH \$555,000 158 businesses monitored for the community's safety.



TRANSPORT \$24,840,800

6700sqm of asphalt road was resealed during October-November 2020.

\$835,812 on the airports' maintenance.



EDUCATION AND WELFARE \$2,637,700

The Newman Youth Centre was open for **1481** hours during the 2020/21 financial year.

260 activities held across the Newman Youth Centre's 13 programs.

9514 people visited Cape Keraudren in the last financial year.

347,395 people have been through the airport this financial year.

3285 people have an Airport Long Term Car Park card.

FACTS ABOUT YOUR RATES



PROPERTY RENTAL VALUES ARE SET INDEPENDENTLY

The State's Valuer General sets values used to calculate individual rates according to the Gross Rental Value (GRV) a property could raise if rented. In many country areas, unimproved values (UV) are used according to land value.

HOW COSTS OF SERVICES AFFECT RATES

Did you know your rates may also pay for services like disability access and inclusion programs, rangers, youth programs, community events, waste services and health inspections?

HOW OTHER CHARGES AFFECT RATES

Services Council pay for, such as street lighting, are often subject to price increases. These costs are passed on to council which increases budget requirements, which in turn increases rates.

HOW COMMUNITY FACILITIES AFFECT RATES

The local community determines priorities for services and facilities, which impact upon Council budget requirements, which in turn, increases rates.
